



Evacuation During War


Approximately 60 children and staff from Ashkelon homes were evacuated and relocated to the youth village in Ben Shemen for 5 weeks at the start of the war.

Special Needs Care

All 170 children with special needs received enhanced care during the closure of educational frameworks in Israel.

Military Recruitment Support

Around 124 Orr Shalom young adults enlisted in the army as lone soldiers, with 46 serving as fighters in Gaza and the northern border since October 7. Orr Shalom provides ongoing financial and emotional support to these young adults during this challenging period.

In these tough times, our commitment didn't waver; we continued to provide constant, round-the-clock care.
